Children's ministries chart a new course

Children's ministries at All Saints' produced two significant developments during September. Sunday worshippers on September 11 learned that Julia Taylor-Powell has decided to step down as our children's Work Co-Ordinator and Evangelist.

Throughout the summer Julia had a growing sense that God was calling her to a wider ministry, yet still embracing some work with young people. While pondering on the future, and having decided to move on, Julia became aware of a potential new opening, a staff vacancy having arisen unexpectedly at Sowing Seeds Ministries.

Julia decided to apply, and Terry Doyle, SSM Operations Manager, told In Touch he was confident her appointment would be approved by the Trustees on 4 October. In that case, after almost seven years in children's ministries, Julia would become Female Prison and Outreach Worker with Gram Seed's organisation, going into Hassockfield secure training centre in Consett, as well as offering one-to-one

mentoring to troubled students at the King's and Macmillan Academies in Middlesbrough. Julia's vacant post at All Saints' is now to be advertised both internally and externally.

Meanwhile, Jan Peters, our Children and Families Outreach Worker, has successfully launched a bold initiative to link up with other churches across Stockton. Responding to a growing number of inquiries, Jan convened a meeting at All Saints' on September 6, expecting around 20 people to attend.

In the event, nearer 40 turned up from most of the main denominations and free churches in the area, with others expressing interest. Jan is now busy establishing an information network to share ideas and resources for ministry to under fives and families in these churches, possibly with a joint meeting once a term.

The Erosion of Belief



I clicked the 'like' button on a Facebook wall post from Julia Taylor-Powell today. It was a quote from someone called Jim Watkins; "A river cuts through rock, not because of its power, but because of its persistence." (If you don't know anything about Facebook, forgive the jargon; a wall post is basically a statement on a public forum that people can respond to if they wish with a comment or simply with a thumbs-up of approval).

I gave this little one-liner a thumbs-up because I think it sums up quite succinctly the teaching in the New Testament about the life of faith we are all called to live.

What do you think is the difference between faith and faithfulness? Let me ask you to stop reading for a minute and think about that...

We sometimes think that faith is about believing that something is true and that faithfulness is about an attitude of consistency or steadfastness. But, in the New Testament, our two English words faith and faithfulness translate one and the same word - because in biblical thought faith and faithfulness mean much the same thing (Look up Romans 3.3, Romans 4.20,

Galatians 5.22 and 1 Corinthians 2.5 - it's the same word in Greek).

This is because the essence of faith is not just assenting to a set of theological propositions but committing to an enduring, consistent walk - following Jesus whatever the cost.

That's why Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up. (Luke 18.1) It's why Paul likened his life to a marathon race where he had to stay on track until he hit the tape (Philippians 3.12-14).

And it's why we humbly serve without grumbling, why we love the loveless without flagging, why we joyfully give without counting and why we pray without ceasing.

It feels like a slog sometimes. But, by the grace of God, we are carving Jesus-shaped valleys into rocks of unbelief.

Big boost for kids and families networking plan

Over the past year a growing number of people from various churches in the area have approached me to ask if they can come along and see 'Play and Praise' in action, as well as our Big Ted event, toddler groups and family events. Each one was seeking advice or fresh ideas about how to move forward with ministry to under 5's and families in their churches.

I have had a big heart for church unity for many years, but over the past six months God has spoken to me afresh and has given me a renewed passion for encouraging all those involved in children's ministry (in particular under 5's and families) to get together to share ideas and resources, and be a support for one another.

So I decided to do something about it, and contacted as many churches in the Stockton area as I could to see if they would be interested in joining together for a networking evening. The response was very enthusiastic, so I organised a get-together on Tuesday 6 September.

I didn't know how many would turn up, but was hoping that we might get at least 15-20 people. However, I was very excited and slightly overwhelmed when more and more people arrived. In the end we had a total attendance of 38 with a few others keen to join who couldn't make the meeting.

Most of the denominations were represented, including Methodists, Anglicans, Baptists, Salvation Army, United Reformed, together with various free churches.

After welcoming everyone with drinks and cakes, we had a sharing time where people told us their stories of what childrens and families activities they are running, which was encouraging to hear. There`s more great things going on than we think, and a few shared about new ventures they are about to embark on.



There was plenty of laughter as we tried out a few new action songs and watched the puppets teach us the 'Mr Cow' song. In a lovely, friendly atmosphere, people showed genuine interest in each others activities, and there was a keenness to ask questions and learn from each others experiences.

A successful evening provided a lot of positive feedback, and a good response to my suggestion of us meeting up once a term. I will be arranging the next meeting to take place in January 2012.

This all happened just after I had applied for funding from a Christian organisation called 'Project One', which supports people doing ministry that focuses on encouraging unity/networking and outreach projects. So I have added this new development alongside the project I had already agreed to do. The funding I receive will enable me to spend time being a co-ordinator for this exciting networking project. I am also looking forward, as part of that, to offering my practical support, and sharing any resources I have with churches who would like me to.

Chris, myself, and our puppet team are also offering to provide puppet shows to churches involved in outreach, as well as planning to organise a puppet training event this autumn for anyone interested in learning puppetry and setting up their own church team.

I am very much looking forward to seeing the good things that God has got in store for all of us as we seek to work together in unity, serving the many precious children and their families, that God has placed in our care.

Pastoral ministry bid is successful

Three years of study lie ahead for Jayne Davies who has set her sights on becoming an Authorised Pastoral Assistant (APA) in Durham Diocese.

An established member of All Saints' pastoral team, Jayne has now completed the Diocesan application process for the course, which consists of nine short modules.

It follows an "action reflection" approach, emphasising the importance of developing awareness of self, God and others through careful listening and reflection. People in every parish are involved in informal pastoral care - it is central to the work and witness of the church. APAs take on a more formal role, as they are authorised to be part of the church's organised pastoral ministry.

Since first coming to All Saints' just over four years ago, Jayne has become actively involved with a number of church initiatives such as the "seated exercises" event and Connect, as well as assisting with Flame and Just Believe.

Reflecting on this next stage of her spiritual journey, Jayne told In Touch: "Throughout my Christian life I have always been involved in pastoral things such as visiting, and mostly in a listening role, such as being available to people on Sundays."

You know Christmas is coming when Peter Barratt's start clearing space to

create 'Santa's Grotto' and you can be sure the first person to let you know this is happening is Tim Wye-Williams. Christmas is supposed to be a wonderful time of year with lots of joy and celebration when we, as Christians, remember all that Jesus has done for us.... not to mention PRESENTS!!

The sobering truth, however, is that for many people Christmas is not a time of celebration, but a time of stress and worry when you know that you don't really have enough money to buy all the things that you perhaps are expected to buy. No-one wants to let their children down when the latest games consoles are out and the iPhone 5 is on its way...

Perhaps now is therefore a good time to start planning for Christmas financially. The following may well help you to be less worried, less stretched, and hopefully less in debt by January 2012.

- Make a list of all the people you need to buy for
- Write down a reasonable amount to spend on each person
- Estimate the additional food costs of Christmas Dinner
- Make allowance for crackers and party poppers!

- Don't forget the 'extras' such as wrapping paper and cards

This will give you an indication of how much Christmas might cost you. The next step would be to see how much you can save between now and December. If this is looking difficult, maybe you need to adjust the figures in step 2 above.

Other ideas that might help save money:

- Use your Tesco clubcard vouchers to pay for your food shopping (or some gifts)
- Shop around online for the cheapest deals (don't leave it to the last minute, and use The Giving Machine!)
- Keep checking moneysavingexpert.com for the latest advice

Finally, if things are looking like you still need to borrow money, take advantage of interest free deals. Fenwicks in Newcastle, for example, offer a four-payment scheme which can certainly ease pressure on the monthly budget without adding the worry of high interest charges

Benjamin Franklin once said "By failing to prepare, you are preparing to fail." Let's not bury our heads in the sand about finance, but embrace it in order to fully enjoy the festive period.
