# **Chairman's Report**

Someone asked me in September 2011 how I was doing and I replied, "Great. This is the first time since my arrival here in July 2008 that I feel I am not having to manage a crisis."

Whether it was a knife-edge pastoral situation, a Noise Abatement Order from the Council, repeated website and e-mail hacking, an official complaint, vandalism, a leadership marriage breakdown or some other calamity, my first three years here all had a dash of *annus horribilis* about them.


And yet, even in those times, there was nowhere on earth I would rather be. This is where God has called me. This is what I was born to do. I love this church and it is an honour to lead it. Nothing in that baptism of fire persuaded me otherwise. Nevertheless, it is really good to feel that a prolonged rocky patch is behind us and, though every week still brings many challenges, it no longer feels like a day out with the four horsemen of the Apocalypse!

The "Every Home" vision is about to enter its third year and - as is so often the case in God's economy - as we have evangelised, the church has started to grow. I pray that as a response to the sustained effort of outreach from April to July this year God will add others too. If the Holy Spirit drives our mission I am confident he will.

But church *growth* without church *health* will tend to run through the hands like water as soon as trouble arrives. If we tend first to the *health* of the church, growth usually follows.

Healthy churches get a perfect balance between three vital areas; worship, fellowship and mission. A church that is strong on worship but weak on mission and fellowship might have great services but everyone goes home straightaway afterwards and there's no concern for the outside world. Churches strong on fellowship but weak on worship and mission will be friendly and supportive but with little sense of God's empowering presence or his heart for the lost.

When I arrived here I felt the weakest area was mission, particularly our engagement with non-Christians outside the four walls of our building (see right). So the "Every Home" Vision was born. As a result, today I think the circles are more balanced.



So what now? We grow *each circle together*. Our verse for the year from Genesis 28 is about *worship*; encountering the living God. *Mission* carries on apace with the continued implementation of our vision. *Fellowship* needs to keep pace too – initiatives like the Joint APCM Service and shared lunch as well as a wide-ranging proposal before the MDT will grow and enrich our fellowship further. That each circle expands to the glory of God is my prayer for the next year.

One final note; three dearly loved members; Derek Bartram, Ann Wood and Pemma Littlehailes have died since the last APCM. We miss them and find consolation in the glorious truth that the Church is the only organization on earth that never loses a member through death.

# **Treasurer's Report**

I would like to start by thanking everyone who has contributed financially to All Saints' Church during 2011. Many of you give regularly either directly through your bank or through the envelope scheme which means that we are able to claim Gift Aid on nearly all of these gifts. Last year, we received £139,000 from congregational giving which was increased to £173,000 with Gift Aid. Other income sources which this year included the Feed in Tariff from the Solar Panels gave us total income for the year of £189,000. After giving away the first 10% of our income, we gave £77,000 to the Diocese as our contribution to Diocesan Share, around £26,000 on general running costs and £59,000 on mission (including staff costs). Our total expenditure for the year was just over £180,000 meaning that we ended the year with a surplus of £8,000.

Our plans for 2012 require us to be able to generate £180,000 income, which at current levels is going to be challenge and the PCC have approved a budget for the year with a deficit of £4,000. I know that some people have already reviewed their giving and I am grateful to those of you who have responded. Please give generously throughout this coming year so we can realise all of the plans we believe God has for us as we look forward.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has helped me in my role as Treasurer over the last three years and I am delighted to be passing the job onto a pair of safe hands.

## **Parochial Church Council (PCC)**

The PCC has a total of 18 members this year and consists of the clergy and churchwardens of the parish, together with a number of representatives of the laity elected at the annual parochial church meeting of the parish or laity who are members of Durham Diocesan Synod or Stockton Deanery Synod from All Saints'. Formally, the PCC are trustees of All Saints and are responsible for our financial affairs and the care and maintenance of the church fabric and its contents. Overseeing the church's finances has been a major part of the PCC's work during 2011. Other matters dealt with at PCC during 2011 have included:

- Decisions around staffing following the resignation of Rob Pepper;
- Continuation of progress on quinnquennial report actions on the condition of our church building and prioritizing the required repairs, with particular focus on church roof state;
- Retain oversight of the church's finances approving budgets, agreeing additional requests for expenditure;
- Approval of various formal process e.g. drivers' bank and children's activities and leaders;
- Ensure we are complying with our own policies particularly Health and Safety Procedures;
- Provide encouragement and oversight of key ministry activities;
- Received reports from Deanery Synod on developments within the Deanery.

Please pray for us. We really appreciate your support. The PCC in 2011 did have a few vacancies - please consider if you could offer yourself to serve on the PCC in 2012.

## **Ministry Development Team (MDT)**

- discussed and agreed priorities for children's ministry in the light of Julia Powell's departure
- conducted an exercise to identify which of our ministries have momentum behind them and which are running out of steam
- gave consideration to a new proposal for a ministry designed to build fellowship throughout the church

We will pursue these last two bullet points in the months to come. I would like to express my thanks to all who serve on the MDT with me (Sola Adeboye, Linda Emerton, John Littlehailes, Chris Peters and Sylvia Wilson). It's a great team to work with.

#### **Deanery Synod**

The first Deanery Synod after the Parish's AGMs was held in May at St Paul's Newtown. This meeting received presentations from Rev David Osman and Fran Wood on the different aspects of women bishops. Fran and David were part of a team set up by the Diocese to brief Deanery Synods on this matter before the key Diocesan Synod vote. The case for and against women bishops and the other issues surrounding this topic were explained well and at the end of meeting attendees were asked to show where their own views lay by use of "post-it's" on various sliding scales. No vote was taken as this was a Diocesan Synod voting matter.

Most meetings during the year received updates on the pastoral reorganisation occurring in Billingham and the surrounding parishes following the resignation of Rev Stephen Liddle and retirement of Canon Richard Smith. Towards the end of the year a scheme has been presented to the parishes directly involved and this scheme is currently in consultation. As in previous years Synod welcomed various guest speakers – the talk by Stockton Town Pastors at the October meeting was particular inspiring and thought provoking.

Oversight of Deanery parish share payments remained a regular agenda item - both in providing updates but also in discussion on how the share should be allocated in 2012. Looking ahead into 2012 the Deanery Plan will continue to be rolled out and developed further with groups of parishes coming together to explore closer working. The following members of the congregation sit on Deanery Synod – Gill Clayton, Lucy Falcus, Bruce Merrick, Janet Atkinson and Margaret Vaughan (+ clergy).

## **Diocesan Synod**

The May 2011 meeting engaged with the mission—based "Fresh Expressions" project, which aims to reach non-church people in our changing culture, and with the equally vital topic of giving, which is a diocesan priority, and should be part of every Christian's thinking. Sadly the parish share contributions across the Diocese had gone down from over 90% of the amount requested in 2006 to approx 84% in 2010. The share request for 2012 was not rising, and the hope was that deaneries would do their best to ensure payment in full. In September the main item was the legislation concerning women in the episcopate, the principle having been previously settled. All three "houses", i e bishops, clergy and laity, voted in favour, as they have in all but two dioceses in England. An amendment seeking to alter proposed arrangements for alternative oversight of a parish which declares itself unable to accept the change was defeated.

In November Bishop Mark led on past and new priorities for the diocese. Non-standard timings for church services and activities have been helping to bring in new people. Lay ministry will need increase in the light of lower clergy availability. In terms of giving, each parish will be encouraged to develop its own strategy, in addition to diocesan-wide discussions on parish share. Bishop Justin plans to launch a prayer and spirituality programme.

# **Churchwardens' Report**

The past year has seen a number of significant events at All Saints' Church, and as Churchwardens we have always sought to seek God's will and pursue the best interests for our clergy, staff, congregation, church buildings, and property.

With Rob Pepper moving on from the role of Church Operations Manager, a number of roles and responsibilities had to be delegated to members of staff, the clergy and us wardens. Whilst this has been challenging at times, we hope that church life has continued to run as efficiently as possible, and we extend our thanks for the support of the PCC, clergy, staff and volunteers who all strive to make All Saints' the fantastic place of worship that it is.

Our Archdeacon, the Venerable Nick Barker, made his 5-yearly visitation to us in September. This is to ensure all of our records are being kept up-to-date and safe, that our valuables are kept secure, that our buildings are in good condition, and that all insurance and policies are in place. This was naturally a very busy and important time for us, but the visit went well, and the Archdeacon was satisfied that all was in order.

Over the past year we have, with the approval of the PCC and Diocese, replaced our nave lights (which had become unreliable) with energy-efficient LED units.

We have also replaced taps in all toilets. We recognise these are not of the desired quality and are seeking with the installer to rectify this. The aim was to have taps that cannot be left running, as this happened frequently.

Recent exploratory work carried out on the drains under the car park has revealed some urgent problems which we are in the process of resolving.

After many years of patching up our 100-year-old roof, we have also launched the Raise The Roof project, which aims to completely replace it and add a layer of insulation. This is not a cheap task, and we were thrilled at the generous response to the gift day held in January, as well as the overwhelming support for the project which we hope will bless future congregations for another 100 years. We will be setting up a committee to oversee this project, and work with the Diocese Architect as we go through the planning and construction periods.

In all we do our aim and prayer is that we might support John, Sylvia and the Staff team, and ensure that our church buildings are well looked after to enable His Kingdom to grow in this place.

#### **MAKE DISCIPLES**

#### **Just Believe**

The past year has seen big changes in our Sunday children's ministry. Julia Taylor-Powell resigned from her position as Sunday co-ordinator in the summer, and since the autumn the groups have been led by volunteers from the congregation. The following is a brief summary of what has been happening in the various groups:-

Crèche is now well established in the library, caring for 0-3 yr olds during our 10.30am service, except for Engage service week when all the under 5's meet together for a fun worship and Bible story time hosted by Big Ted. In crèche we provide toys, books and singing with instruments when appropriate, providing a secure and fun introduction to church for the children. Attendance varies from 1-7 on any week, and we have 8 children on the registrar. Crèche is led by Fiona Spratt, Sola Adeboye, and Linda Emerton with assistance once a month from Dami Adeboye.

The 'Orange' group is for children of nursery and reception class age. It is led by Stuart Main, Chris and Jan Peters, and Julie Harrison. The Scripture Union 'Bubbles' program is used for the teaching, which enables the children to develop their faith and understanding of The Bible in a fun and playful way. Topics have included starting the New Year looking at how God is with us from year to year, meeting Old Testament kings, Hezekiah and Josiah, finding out about Jesus; how he is a friend to all of us, how amazing he is and how forgiving he is. The children enjoy re-enacting bible stories, craft or art activities, action songs with instruments and dancing and sometimes we even get a visit from our puppet friends! In the two months so far this year we've had 16 children attending at an average of 6 per week. The children really seem to enjoy the sessions. They are very attentive, knowledgeable and enthusiastic, and it is wonderful to see them remembering the themes and stories from week to week and growing in their faith and love of the Bible.

The Red and Blue group (school yrs 1-6) have joined together under the leadership of Stuart and Donna Levin. Other leaders this past year have included Julie Harrison, Steve Wilkes, Carol and Cerian Bridge, Alice Griffiths and Jayne Davies. The children have been following a fun packed 10 week programme called 'The Amazing adventure'. They have been discovering how they can have an amazing adventure following Jesus in their own lives, as well as looking at the amazing journey and adventure of various characters in the Bible. Fun activities enjoyed by the children include Drama, games, craft, memory verses, action songs, storytelling and more! Since January 46 children have attended this older group at an average of 18 children per week. It is great to see the children growing in their faith, experiencing God in their lives and building friendships together.

In this year of transition please pray for all the children who come along, for their leaders, and for wisdom for the way ahead and current plans to employ another Children's worker in 2013.

## **Bookshop**

The Church Book Stall has run throughout the year. Books are selected on a sale or return basis from the Baptist Tabernacle Book Shop and are changed quarterly. Books can also be ordered on request. ## **Growing Leaders Course**

The Growing Leaders course is currently running its third cohort. June 2011 saw 13 people complete the course and a further 12 people joined us in September.

Based on the greatest book ever written on leadership 'The Bible', the Growing Leaders course runs over 9 months - 7 evening sessions plus 2 all day sessions.

In the 1st term we explored why leadership matters, what is leadership, what is different about Christian leadership and examine our own leadership styles and its impact on others and why it is important to ensure our identity is rooted in our relationship with God, finally finishing the term with clarification of our calling.

The course starts the new year by looking at vision and how we determine where God is leading us. In February we looked at how we can help others to grow as disciples and leaders themselves and finished the term how we can develop teams who work well together and support those which are less productive.

The final term examines the realities of leadership, how we handle the costs and unrealistic expectations of being a Christian leader, the importance of staying fresh and maintaining focus during our leadership journey.

Mentors: Fundamental to the success of the course are the mentors. Each participant chooses a mentor who meets, supports, challenges and prays with them throughout the course - a big thank you to the mentors for their time and commitment.

It has been a blessing and privilege to work together with other members of the church, sharing the word of God and studying what we can learn from the greatest leader of all, Jesus Christ. If you are interested in joining the next cohort in September please speak to John or myself.
