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INTRODUCTION

Chairman's Report

As I look back at 2018, the standout things for me were:

- An encouraging visit from Alan Farish 10 years after leaving for Stockton Parish Church
- The launch of a faith discovery group for unchurched teenage boys
- The Marriage Course
- Thy Kingdom Come week of prayer
- The arrival of the Arnold family with Paul ordained as our Curate
- New Wine Prayer Ministry training day with a team from the Belfrey in York
- The completion of REACh phase 1 and opening ceremony
- New Wine Inspire at Hollybush
- An adult baptism service in September
- WWI 100th Anniversary Remembrance Service
- The revamping of our Youth Room
- The Christmas Angel children's production
- Sermon series on Mark's Gospel, Ezekiel, Discipleship, Jonah and Worship
- Carols by Candlelight with preacher Bishop Paul, attended by our MP and his family

The biggest shock of the year came in May when we discovered that our main contractor on REACh phase 1 had suddenly ceased trading, leaving their subcontractors, who had worked on site here, unpaid. We had already settled about 90% of our bills. It was a very stressful and testing time, but God is faithful. Thanks to the legendary, near miraculous generosity of the congregation at All Saints' we paid out *again* to ensure that no tradesman doing work in this church went home unrewarded. We had no legal liability – but we felt it was the righteous thing to do, so we did it. And God provided.

Just before last year's APCM, but too late for the annual report, Miriam Fortune went to be with the Lord. Miriam was for many years a regular at 9am and the Lunch Club. May she rest in peace and rise in glory.

The church has continued to grow numerically, year on year, for at least the last five years. Martin Howard compiled some statistics at the end of 2018. They showed that in 2013 only twice did attendance at 10.30am exceed 160. In 2018 it was 25 times – every other week. Attendance exceeded 180 only once in 2013. Last year it was 8 times – one week in six.

I learned a long time ago though not to be preoccupied by numbers. Remember that God punished King David for counting his army because he did it to massage his ego and measure his greatness in his own eyes. No, we do not want to get obsessed about bums on seats. Instead, our focus is to pour all our energies, under God, into ensuring that the church is healthy and stays that way. If you keep the church healthy, the growth looks after itself. The keys to a healthy church are shared visionary leadership, inspiring worship, sound biblical teaching, every-member ministry and an outward, evangelistic focus.

As we navigate through 2019, continuing to grow in the knowledge and love of God, building team and developing strategy ahead of the church plant into Newtown, and aiming to deliver REACh phase 3, I will make every effort once again to honour the Lord in everything and serve you with love, his precious people.

Treasurer's Report

I am continuously astounded by God's generosity and by members of All Saints'. People obviously give sacrificially to the work of the church because they believe in the work we do. It has been an expensive year, but God has blessed us richly in giving us a surplus of about £14,000 in the general fund budget allowing us to give money back into other projects in this country and overseas. It has also allowed us to put more money in to upgrading the heating system in the church.

Our contractors went in to administration near the end of Phase 1 of our REACh building project, leaving sub-contractors unpaid. We are so grateful to members of the church who gave above and beyond to this project so we were able to pay the subcontractors the money owing to them. We believe in the Biblical principle that workers should be paid for the work they do. Deuteronomy 24:14-15. We want to be excellent stewards of the money God has given us and should not waste it, but neither should we allow those hired to do work for us to be impoverished because of it.

We spent more than budgeted for in renovating the flats that we own making it a comfortable home and workspace for our tenants.

We overspent on training our staff by sending them on training courses, but this is an important investment to maintain excellence as they work for Jesus.

Again, I am extremely grateful for all the help I am given in keeping up with the work as treasurer. Jennifer Brown was my assistant for several months last year, but due to other time constraints and as she is no longer on the PCC, it was felt that she give up this post. Thank you, Jennifer for all your help. Richard Spratt has kindly agreed to step in, so please pray for him.

John Belmont deals with the staff's salaries and pensions. He also continues to keep me right with the Excel spreadsheet.

Margaret Vaughan tirelessly trawls through the spreadsheets and bank statements from which she claims the Gift Aid owing to us. In 2018 we were able to claim nearly £41,000 which was added to the General account. Not an insignificant sum I am sure you will agree.

Gill Wake continues to count the money put in the offering and goes to the bank weekly to pay this in to the account. She also types in the amount on her spreadsheet and sends it across to me.

Craig Aston reads the utility meters monthly and sends the readings over to our utility providers so our bills are kept as accurate as possible.

As you can see, the finances of the church are a team effort and I certainly would not be able to do it on my own.

I continue to enjoy serving as the church treasurer, but if any other member of All Saints' feels called to take on this role, please do not hesitate to ask for more details of what it entails.

Planting Curate's Report

What a year! This time last year my family and I were just gathering quotes for moving house to Stockton. When we arrived, we received such a great welcome, and we want to thank you so much for your grace and kindness towards us as we settle in.

The rubber has now hit the road for the graft into St Paul's, Newtown, and so much has taken place that keeps us firm in our trust in God's call to this place:

- 1. Clear Vision: After much consultation and prayer and fasting, we know that God wants us to plant a church that is 'Living, Loving and Led.' A building open every day of the week, a church loving its community, living its faith and led by the Spirit.
- 2. **Two congregations become one:** Newtown Anglicans and Methodists, have combined into a single congregation through a letter of welcome that looked impossible this time last year. This slashes in half the level of red tape for getting change done and increases representation from across the current congregation.
- 3. People: Most importantly from a people perspective, two groups have formed: the Newtown Life Group (from All Saints) who have a focus on the mission of the church from an All Saints perspective; and the St Paul's Plant Governance Group who are the working group on change at St Paul's and involves Diocesan, Deanery and members of All Saints and St Paul's.

Next Steps - This year is about building: real physical building work at St Paul's and the most important aspect of building team for the graft. We are planning some exciting stuff: Great worship and prayer, fantastic children and youth provision, cafe church, school run drop-in coffee, CAP partnership, Alpha evangelism and a 24-7 prayer community alongside what currently goes on at St Paul's... all in an amazing, fit-for-purpose building...

...But all that is just empty stuff without you!

We need people with gifts in **hospitality** and evangelism, 'people' people who will be willing to build relationships both inside and outside of the church.

Leaders whose heartbeat is to empower and disciple future leaders.

People with a heart for those on the margins, where the margin is the mainstream.

We need people who want to build church, people who are blessed with gifts of **administration** and **organisation**.

People who have a sense that God is wanting to **send** them, who feel that connection with God drawing them to this place.

Enthusiasts who are brimming with stories of the Good News and can't wait to see people come to Christ.

Carers who want to form deep relationship with and look after those around them, and those who are gifted at **teaching** others — of all ages — what it means to live, love and be led as church.

As we step into this adventure, we need God most of all, and we will be looking to more intentional prayer about this as we build towards it, so keep your eyes and ears peeled.

MDT (Ministry Development Team)

The MDT prayerfully considers what God is calling All Saints' to do, encourages every-member ministry and thinks strategically about refocusing or resourcing existing ministries.

Last year the MDT:

- Reviewed Christmas, Easter and August ministry
- Discussed ways to strengthen the 9am service resulting in new liturgy books with less jargon and more options for increased variety
- Recommended simplifying the various names for non-eucharistic services (Service of the Word, Worship Word and Ministry, Engage...) to 'Morning Worship'
- Created a Welcome Pack to be given to all newcomers
- Recommended additional coffee service points after 10.30am to reduce long queues
- Regularly looked at and commented on REACh plans from a ministry point of view
- Discussed ideas for accommodating numerical growth at 10.30am
- Prayed with and brainstormed with Paul Arnold about the strategy for preparing the ground before sending a team out to Newtown at Easter 2021

REACh

2018 saw the project swing into action with Phase 1 - remodelling the narthex, chapel, office and library and glazing the front doors. The work progressed well until out main contractor ceased trading. We then took over the remaining work and employed contractors to finish it and paid those who had not been paid by the original contractor. A new office, meeting room and enlarged doors between the nave and narthex were completed. In the summer we had the front doors glazed making it possible to see into the church from the street.

The Reordering Steering Group has met many times during 2018. Having decided to split the project into 4 phases the designs for phases 2 (cafe extension), 3 (chancel remodelling) and 4 (nave extension) have been developed over the year. We have applied for planning permission from Stockton Council for phases 2 and 4. We have had fruitful discussions regarding the requirement for additional parking and conservation of many listed trees.

After reviewing the sequencing of phases 2,3 and 4 we decided to bring phase 3 forward; we have applied for a faculty from the Diocesan Advisory Committee for phase 3 with the view to completing phase 3 during 2019.

Deanery Synod

Stockton Deanery has increased in size over the past year as we welcomed the Upper Skerne part of Sedgefield, taking our Deanery to fourteen parishes. We meet six times per year as lay representatives and clergy, and are tasked to plan the mission of the deanery, encourage each other and link in with the Diocese and other Deaneries. A summary of our meetings over this year:

May 2018: Finalising the Deanery Plan, including prayer for our Deanery, and hearing about the Diocesan Parish Giving Scheme.

July 2018: Hearing the celebrations and challenges from Parishes around the Deanery, and praying for each parish.

November 2018: Hearing from Tim Wye Williams the work Youth for Christ is doing in the area, and also meeting our new Archdeacon Rick Simpson who told us his story about coming to faith, and helped us reflect on our Deanery Plan.

January 2019: Meeting concentrated on Resourcing churches and plans from Stockton Parish Church and All Saints' Church, with plans around the Deanery and guest speaker David Tomlinson from the Diocese.

March 2019: An uplifting meeting highlighting the work going on around the Deanery with our children and young people, followed by some time to network with other Parishes and two representatives of Bishop's Council.

Diocesan Synod

There have been two meetings of Diocesan Synod in 2018. At the June meeting topics included approving the Diocesan accounts, receiving reports on safeguarding and reflecting on the role / responsibilities of Bishop of Jarrow as the time approached for this role to become vacant through Bishop Mark's retirement in autumn 2018.

Many at the meeting were moved to tears during the item on anti-slavery and human trafficking. The personal testimony from the foster son of one of the diocesan clergy giving his experience of being trafficked to this country and held as a slave was harrowing and profoundly humbling. This was followed with updates on human trafficking in our region and how the church might respond.

The November meeting started with each "house" (clergy and laity) electing their new chair for the next three - year cycle. Main items were endorsing the Diocese' budget for 2019, input on how our Church of England schools are being supported to meet the requirements of being a faith school; approval of the Diocesan Safeguarding Policy; briefing on Waymark 2019 (Diocesan conference in autumn 2019) and 2020 year of pilgrimage. The meeting ended with an update on Resourcing Churches bid to central church for funding (which was successful in December 2018).

Fabric Report and Maintenance

This was once again a very busy year for repair, refurbishment and replacement projects at All Saints. 2018 saw the start of our Reach Project with Phase 1 during the Spring. Despite the problems caused by our main contractor going out of business, it was completed by the summer with the glazing of the front doors. Our main entrance is now a brighter and much more welcoming space. Thanks go to our Reach Committee for taking over the project and in particular to Richard Spratt for leading much of this work.

Additional lighting has been installed to the exterior of the buildings around the car park area, making it much safer for those using the car park during the evenings. In July work was carried out at high level to replace some of the lights in both the Nave and Church Centre as well as refitting some of the ceiling tiles.

The summer months saw a refurbishment of our youth room which included new sockets installed, decorating, new furniture and a projector. Part of the decorating included some art work by one of our young people. It is now a superb room to use both by our young people and others who use the room each week.

It is great to have our caretaker Peter on site during the day to deal with the ongoing maintenance of the buildings and grounds.

This year has seen some more minor work on the Church flats than last year with the painting of the windows and minor work inside. The commercial tenant of the upstairs flat is really happy with the space and its location close to the station. During the summer our tenants of the ground floor flat were offered a larger property in Yarm which unfortunately meant we were once again looking for a new tenant. Fortunately, we were able to find another tenant quite quickly. Our thanks go to Matt Falcus for liaising with our tenants and managing the flats on a weekly basis.

The end of the year saw the approval of our faculty for the new heating system that we are now benefitting from. Hopefully we will also see the financial benefits of a modern efficient system as we move through 2019.

Numerous other items of work have been carried out on our buildings throughout the year. It is great to have our caretaker Peter on site during the day to deal with the ongoing maintenance of the buildings and grounds.

We continue to work with Jonathan Backhouse to ensure that our H&S policies and risk assessments meet current requirements and update them as required.

It is wonderful to see the church buildings so well used at all times of the day and bookings for use of the facilities continue to be in demand. We are extremely grateful to God for all the people he brings into our buildings and the continued growth of All Saints.

We would also like to thank our fantastic team of assistant wardens who look after our services each week.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding continues to be regarded as one of the PCC priorities and time is made on the agenda for this at every meeting.

In May 2018 the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), came into force and we have worked to ensure we are complying with this legislation.

In March of this year, the Diocese rolled out the new Durham Diocesan Synod Safeguarding Policy - 2019. The PCC have adopted this and its attached policies and we continue to uphold its principles and procedures.

We continue to value safeguarding training for staff and volunteers. A new online training is now available for C1 and we will ensure that those who require training will be able to access it in the coming year. Although we have dealt with two safeguarding issues this year relating to social media, we are thankful to God that they have come to successful conclusions with no residual concerns.

Publicity, Communications and Website

Midweek Worship

At All Saints' we worship together midweek with Morning Prayer (daily), informal Holy Communion and Play and Praise (weekly), Treasure Seekers and Lunch Club services (monthly). Our youth gather in midweek as well for worship and discipleship. Then there are groups meeting fortnightly in homes in their various forms. Finally, there are brief reflections at Seated Exercise and Youth Club. All of this is covered elsewhere in this annual report.

Morning Prayer (30 minutes) draws about 10 people, mostly but not all from the 9am congregation, to pray daily in the temporary chapel for the life of All Saints', our mission partners, local Christian outreach to the poor and needy, the persecuted church and the suffering world.

The midweek Communion service (30 minutes in the Meeting Room) is less formal, with an open discussion on a Bible passage - last year we covered most of Genesis - a simple Eucharistic prayer and time for tea or coffee afterwards in the Youth Room for those who can stay. This service attracts 20-30 people from both the 9am and 10.30am congregations.

Choral Group

The choral group has had another busy year having sung at 18 Church services, plus 2 funerals, 4 weddings and a memorial service for a former member of the choral group.

It does not matter if you cannot read music, (roughly half our members do not) there are no auditions, and we are a friendly group. If you enjoy singing or hearing a choral group singing in harmony please join us for an evening to give it a try.

Prayer

Rob Govier and helpers continue to promote and encourage the work of prayer at All Saints, supplementing those who meet faithfully for morning prayer, a steadfast and continuing work which should not be overlooked! The "Ablaze" monthly meeting has seen a gradual growth in numbers, generally running with around 20-plus attendees. Increasingly, rather than have a tight structure, we have sought The Holy Spirit in the manner of Romans 8:26 regarding prayer topics. Far from becoming unfocussed and undisciplined, we find that He has his own structure and agenda which we can discover if we are sensitive to His leading, as well as bold, and obedient. The regular prayer breakfasts have been led in a similar manner, and although not as well supported, have been times of fervent praying and good fellowship.

Just as The Apostle Paul was aided by the use of "modern" Roman roads to speed the gospel message, we make use of modern electronic highways for Kingdom purposes. The All Saints Facebook group is used for daily distribution of a thirty-day programme of focused prayer topics for the church, it's members, and wider area. A paper copy of these topics can be obtained from Sandra Griffiths. Unfortunately, it is not possible to put these in a neat, manageable, and compact paper document due to the range and scope of issues. Whether we feel comfortable with social media or not, the "prayer work" is getting done, which is our key priority! I would encourage those who do not participate to consider joining the Facebook group, as it is an outstanding means of rapid communication.

Half-nights of prayer have been held, attracting a small but faithful band of prayer warriors, although it would be great to see more saints participating even for half an hour or so. Increasing use has been made of the resources of the "Thy Kingdom Come" initiative, a week of focused national prayer. Overall, across the life of the church, we seem to see more things "coincidentally going better", as well as some specific direct answers to prayer. Prayer ministry after the 1030 service continues to attract those with needs. We continue to both facilitate and encourage effective prayer within All Saints, especially so as we continue to face the challenges of growth, reordering and "planting out" at St Paul's Newton in 2020.

Youth Church and Refresh

Youth (Midweek) Outreach
