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INTRODUCTION

Chairman's Report

In last year's report I wrote:

We cannot say hand on heart that many people have found faith here recently and that is certainly a matter for the whole church to pray about. I am sure we would all like to see more people coming to a saving knowledge of Christ and I believe that, as we come together before God and pray with passion and faith, we will... Our mission states where we are, but our vision is about direction... Where, under God, are we all going? That is a matter I think we need to address as a church and we will be setting about it this spring.

Clearly, the Big Thing last year at All Saints' was agreeing, under God, just what that direction should be. The Vision Day in June was a significant milestone for us in the context of our recent history.

After a presentation on what vision is and what major issues All Saints' faces, people met in discussion groups, fed back, ate together, met in groups and fed back again. By the end of the day we had agreed a Vision Statement and had thought about how it might impact every area of church life.

So this is the direction we are heading in:

We believe that God is calling us to four years of outreach with the objective that every household

in our parish should know that we are a vibrant Christian community ready to

- pray for them
- serve them practically and
- invite them to encounter Jesus Christ.

Alpha, Journeys, detached youth work and so on obviously fit straight into this vision, but we need to see that *outreach is not just about evangelistic programmes arranged by "someone else"*. The New Testament model is different so it is essential that, as a church, we are all equipped to share our faith simply and naturally - and that we all adopt more outwardly focused lifestyles. That means change for a lot of us and that may not be comfortable - as the *Just Walk Across the Room* series has highlighted.

So far, as part of the Vision Plan we have set up a Vision Fund, we have distributed an Alpha invitation and a Special Edition *In Touch* to every home, we have run a successful Alpha course, home visits to families attending Flame have begun and three teaching series have taken place.

Planned for this year;

- Journeys (April-May)
- more teaching on prayer, practical service and personal evangelism
- a practical service mission around the parish in May
- Marriage Course (June-July)
- 2 more Special Editions of In Touch (April and September)
- Alpha (October-December)
- An evening with comedian and magician John Archer (December)

It has been wonderful to see several people come to new faith in Christ or come back to church after a time away. Let us give thanks and glory to God and pray faithfully that we will see much more.

Treasurer's Report

I would like to start by thanking everyone who has contributed financially to All Saints' Church during 2010. Many of you give regularly either directly through your bank or through the envelope scheme which means that we are able to claim Gift Aid on nearly all of these gifts.

Last year, we received just over £130,000 from congregational giving which was increased to almost \pounds 170,000 with Gift Aid. Other income sources such as rent from Church House gave us total income for the year of £182,000.

After giving away the first 10% of our income, we gave \pounds 73,000 to the Diocese, around \pounds 30,000 on general running costs and \pounds 56,000 on mission. Our total expenditure for the year was just under \pounds 177,000 meaning that we ended the year with a surplus of \pounds 5,000.

Our plans for 2011 require us to be able to generate almost £190,000 income, which at current levels is not going to be a possibility and the PCC have approved a budget with a potential deficit of £10,000 by the end of December. I know that some people have already reviewed their giving and I am grateful to those of you who have responded. Please give generously throughout this coming year so we can realise all of the plans we believe God has for us during 2011.

Parochial Church Council (PCC)

The PCC has a total of 19 members this year and consists of the clergy and churchwardens of the parish, together with a number of representatives of the laity elected at the annual parochial church meeting of the parish or laity who are members of Durham Diocesan Synod or Stockton Deanery Synod from All Saints. Formally, the PCC are trustees of All Saints and are responsible for our financial affairs and the care and maintenance of the church fabric and its contents. Overseeing the church's finances has been a major part of the PCC's work during 2010. Other matters dealt with at PCC during 2010 have included:

- Appointment of new members to the Ministry Development Team
- Vision Day preparations and support of development of 3 year Vision
- Gift day
- Update on "Choose Life" and decision to employ on 20 hours / week on a permanent basis an additional youth pastor
- Noise complaint resolution
- Environment group
- Continuation of progress on quinnquennial report actions on the condition of our church building and prioritising the required repairs, with particular focus on church roof state
- Approval of various formal process eg drivers' bank and children's activities and leaders

Ministry Development Team (MDT)

The MDT prayerfully considers what God is calling All Saints' to do, encourages every-member ministry and thinks strategically about refocusing or resourcing existing ministries. The MDT is a think-tank with an advisory role; it is not an executive body.

In 2010 the MDT spent considerable time praying over and looking at the Vision and how it should be kept on track and developed. I envisage that this will continue throughout the life of the Four-Year vision.

Last year the MDT:

- organized an excellent open-to-all prayer evening
- recommended to the PCC that a Hardship Fund be set up to help people in need
 - conducted an in depth review of the 10:30am service following static or declining attendances
- recommended wholesale changes to the 10:30am All-Age service (now relaunched as 'Engage')
- reviewed home groups and recommended John Benjamin as Home Group coordinator
- examined provision for music in worship at all three services
- conducted an in depth review of the 6:30pm service which was becoming 'stale'

I would like to express my thanks to all who serve on the MDT and particularly to Tim Emerton, Sandra Griffiths, Rob Pepper and Nicky Pepper who stood down during the year.

Deanary Synod

The first Deanery Synod after the Parish's AGMs was held in May at Ian Ramsey School. Linda Ross (Lay Chair) welcomed new members. Janet Wilson the new Head teacher of Ian Ramsey gave her view on the future of the school and explained how it would sit alongside the Christian community. She presented an inspired and passionate vision of the school being a 'Virtual Learning Environment' operating alongside a 'Christian Learning Environment'.

The July Synod gave us a chance to hear Anna De Lange of the Diocesan Liturgical Group and her presentation "Wings for Worship" or how the laity can be involved in worship.

The September Synod welcomed the Area Dean, David Brooke back from his sabbatical, but the main focus of the meeting was finance. Margaret Vaughan gave a 'State of the Nation' address on the Deanery and Diocesan finance and also spoke about Parish Shares for 2011.

The November Synod had a visit from David Granath, the Director of the Hospital of God, Greatham, who spoke about the work there and how individuals can become involved.

The January meeting looked at some smaller items but mainly focussed on the year ahead and the implications for the Deanery, which I believe will see the Deanery plan once again become the main focus of Synod's discussions.

General Synod

Most of the time at the July 2010 meeting was taken up with working through the details of the legislation concerning women bishops. Many amendments had been proposed aiming to strengthen the position of those who feel they cannot accept this change, but the outcome was that the dioceses may make their own arrangements under a national code of practice. This final draft is ready to go out for local discussion. Other legislation covered clergy pensions, job-sharing in ordained ministry, and fine-tuning of the marriage regulations, whereby a couple can ask to be married in a church where they have a connection, rather than only where they live, as under the old rules. As is traditional at the end of the five years' lifetime of the synod, we had a late night revue performed by the folk with musical, satirical or comical talent – this year there was even a ballroom dancing display by the religious affairs correspondent of the Times. I was sorry to say goodbye after 25 years to many friends, both staff and colleagues. David Brooke, our Area Dean, and Fran Wood from St John's Egglescliffe have been elected and I wish them well.

Quinquennial Inspection and Maintenance

For about 20 years now we have had problems with our Church roof. These have been brought to our attention in Quingennial reports, in addition to our own maintenance checks. From time to time tiles have been replaced and various

'patch – up' work has been done. In the past year we have had to have some more costly work done and on taking advice, both from a roofing contractor and the Diocesan Architect we now need to seriously consider replacing all the tiles and possibly some of the timbers. This will, without doubt be a costly job and if we proceed we will need to look for funding and for interest free loans from friends. In order to bring the roof up to modern standards we would also need to install insulation material, which would, together with proposed window work mentioned in the Wardens report help to make our church warmer. We will shortly be going out for

Estimates and the P.C.C. will then consider the way forward. The alternative is to continue patching but as we have already seen , eventually this will not be a satisfactory solution and in the long term is likely to cost more. We will keep you informed.

Elsewhere, we have been involved in the design and production of a new 'Welcome' sign in the Narthex, and designs for new noticeboards fronting Yarm Road.

Bookshop

The Church Book Stall was the original vision of Kathryn Belmont and was started in July 2008. Books are selected on a sale or return basis from the Baptist Tabernacle Book Shop and are changed quarterly. Books can also be ordered on request.

The Baptist Tabernacle sells the All Saints Church Book Stall books at a 10% discount. This allows the Book Stall opportunity to donate books to the Church Library, and not undercut the Baptist Tabernacle Book Shop. When specific promotions are made, such as, 'Just Walk Across The Room', books were sold at cost price.

During 2010, the Book Stall has moved from the small coffee lounge to the main hall used for coffee after services. It aims to be available after both the 9.00 and 10.30 services. During the week, books are kept in a bookcase in the reception area and are available from Sandra Griffiths during office hours. Since the beginning of 2010, over 120 books have been sold.

Future plans for the Book Stall in 2011 include:

The establishment of a rota of people to assist with the Book Stall;

Regular book reviews by members of the congregation to be shared on the Church website; In Touch magazine and pre-Church power-point presentations.

The past year has seen the group make spectacular progress. From a non- existent start we have really got recycling going strongly in both church and church centre.
