After five years of growth in numbers and finances, and such blessing on our many ministries, we seem to have entered a phase of consolidation where we are not noticeably growing but focusing instead on equipping for ministry and making disciples. Our building is quite full, so we are preparing the team to plant into Newtown and then step on the gas for evangelism again here. It will call for prayer, imagination and hard work – and it will, of course, be under new leadership.

This will be my last Chairman's Report as Vicar of All Saints'. When we came to Teesside from Paris in 2008, we wouldn't have predicted that these would prove to be the happiest years of our lives, certainly amongst the most fruitful professionally.

But we are convinced God is calling us to turn the page and write a new chapter. Since giving our decision to Bishop Paul last June, it has been confirmed in many ways so we are sure it's right, though it will break our hearts to leave.

Our future and yours have uncertainties ahead. Most of us love a comfort zone. Few of us like change and upheaval, but Christians are called to live by faith, not by sight. As someone has said, "Ships are

never safer than when they are in a harbour – but that is not why ships were made." It's time to hoist the sails and catch the wind. An ocean of opportunity and adventure awaits.

Thank you for everything. Kathie and I will never forget you.

Treasurer's Report

As the church treasurer, I have seen so much commitment to the church reflected in the finances. It shows how people love God through their generosity which we experience here at All Saints. Incomings

To begin with I would like to report on voluntary giving from the members of the church. This exceeded the budget for which we are very thankful. Thank you to those who have changed their form of giving to either standing order, bank transfer and via the Parish Giving Scheme. These methods avoid extra charges we pay to the bank when cash or cheques are deposited.

Other income received exceeded the budget too. This was obtained through letting rooms to outside organisations, rent from our flats 558A & 558B Yarm Road and solar panel energy amongst other things. Outgoings

£96,642 was given to Parish Share in the year and a further £21,772 was given to mission organisations – both overseas and locally. This means that almost half of our voluntary giving was given away. I am convinced that this is one of the reasons why God blesses this church so much. Individuals are generous as is the church as a whole.

Nearly £71,000 was spent on mission, outreach and teaching this year. This includes the salaries and pensions paid to our employed staff (not the vicar, nor the curate). Our youth, children and Connect ministries are included in this sum as are visiting speakers and other mission events throughout the year such as Alpha etc.

Maintenance and general upkeep are always necessary. We have spent in excess of £8,000 this year maintaining our building and grounds. Our downstairs flat was treated to double glazing to ensure our tenant remains comfortable.

I would like to say a special thank you to Amanda Thompson who keeps a close eye on our utilities bills and makes sure that we get the best deals from the utility companies. Craig Aston reads the meters monthly and sends our readings each month to the utility and water companies. We are very grateful to you both for these services. Nearly £8,000 is spent on our utility bills.

Nearly £3000 was spent on tea, coffee, biscuits and juice. This enables us to be hospitable on a Sunday and throughout the week. The photocopying and stationery amounted to a further £4,500 this year. As ever, I have appreciated the help given me this year by Richard Spratt as my assistant, Margaret Vaughan as the Gift Aid secretary, Gill Wake who counts and banks the money every week and John Belmont who deals with the staff payroll and the REACh accounts.

This report has not taken into consideration the finances for the REACh project which is separate from the general funds.

It has been a real privilege to serve you all in this role over the past few years. Thank you for trusting me with such an undertaking and for your patience when I have not understood all things financial.

Planting Curate's report

This past year has had lots of ups and downs for us all, but the graft project has definitely been one of the ups for us as church.

This will be the final year of my curacy: it seems strange that we are now here with less than a year to stepping into St Paul's with a mission to become the beating heart of God's love in Newtown and the surrounding areas.

Blessings:

- 1. Building Team We are now a team of 24 gifted people, all committed to joining in God's work to making it the beating heart of his love in Newtown. We would love to hear from you if you are discerning if this is the right move, the work will be hard but such an amazing adventure!
- 2. Building Relationships A team from All Saints is regularly preaching at St Paul's and we will be building up engagement with the existing congregation this year culminating in plans for my family and I joining with St Paul's congregation from January in advance of the launch in April.
- 3. Building place We want to make the place a bustling community hub, where people encounter each other as well as Jesus. We hope to start work in September to make it a warm, open and hospitable place that the community want to call their own.

Key Challenges:

- Money God has been good with funding but this does not cover all the work needed, particularly
 to the building. We are pursuing grant funding from other sources and have phased the
 reordering work we would really welcome a conversation if you feel called to support us
 financially.
- 2. Saying farewell As we come close to sending out we need to deal with the loss that this brings:
 - a. Here -- you will be saying goodbye and needing to adapt as key people go and are replaced.
 - b. The team -- as we 'leave home.'
 - c. St Paul's existing congregation adapting to the new missional culture and size dynamics changing.
- 3. Baking in the detail trying to hear God's plans and not be overly possessive of our own. The team on the planting course in Leeds is really coming to terms with this as we build out plans:
 - a. Plans for missional outreach into the area through being a community hub, fighting poverty, celebrating beauty in brokenness, and inviting people to know Jesus.
 - b. Plans for renewing and revitalising worship and prayer creating a passionate heart of spirituality in the heart of Newtown.
 - c. Plans for creating radical community where people share life as family on mission together.

This was a busy year, with the main focus being on the REACh work (Phase 3 was assured of progress by the end of the year) and on the church planting in Newtown. Safeguarding remains a priority, and the new regular item on the Staff Management Team's work has proven valuable. The Financial items, again regular reports, are very important for the PCC Members: as Trustees of the church they are responsible for the sensible handling of the church's resources. With this, and with the other responsibilities of the group, prayer is an important part of each meeting.

MDT (Ministry Development Team)

The MDT prayerfully considers what God is calling All Saints' to do, encourages every-member ministry and thinks strategically about refocusing or resourcing existing ministries.

Last year, amongst other things, the MDT:

- Agreed a renewed focus on Life Groups with Erin Bunford stepping up as Life Group Advocate
- Encouraged an emphasis on apprenticeship culture for the making of disciples
- Regularly looked at and commented on REACh phase 3 plans from a ministry point of view
- Processed outcomes from GROW Learning Community and Resource Church conference days
- Prayed with and brainstormed with Paul Arnold about the strategy for preparing the ground before sending a team out to Newtown at Easter 2021

I would like to express my thanks to Erin Bunford, Shiromi Davison, Sue Ireland and Donna Levin whose term on MDT ended at the end of the year. Their contribution was outstanding. We are blessed to have Paul Arnold, Matt Falcus, Rob Govier and Peter Gray continuing on team.

Early in 2020 the process to add new names to the team started. At the time of writing, that process was not complete.

REACh

In 2018 it was decided to change the order of the phases so that phase 3 would precede phase 2. To that object the Reordering Steering Group has met many times during 2019, including several meetings with our architects, in order to finalise the plans. In August the plans went out to 6 contractors.

In September 4 contractors returned their tenders. After reviewing them it was decided that there were insufficient funds to commission a contractor immediately, as had been the plan. Instead we asked the congregation for further funding with the hope that the work can commence in early 2020.

Deanery Synod

Stockton Deanery includes fourteen parishes, and we meet six times per year as lay representatives and clergy. Deanery Synod is tasked to plan the mission of the deanery, encourage each other and link in with the Diocese and other Deaneries. We have a Deanery Plan which is available from your Deanery reps and this year there is a task group formed to look at how we forward the mission of the Deanery.

A summary of our meetings over this year:

May 2019: Resourcing churches update from Paul Arnold and talk from Martin Anderson about conflict resolution project, following his sabbatical

July 2019: Welcome to new clergy members, and a visit from Bishop Sarah introducing herself and her aims as Bishop of Jarrow.

September 2019: Resourcing churches update and discussion ahead of the Waymark Diocesan conference.

November 2019: Reflections on the Diocesan Waymark conference, and discussion and vote to approve the Deanery Plan.

January 2020: Update from our Resourcing churches, and a talk from Bishop Sarah regarding Bishops Mission orders and how this relates to a church plant at Wynyard. Many meetings of the Deanery Synod are open to non-members of synod – speak to your Parish reps if you are interested in attending.

Diocesan Synod

There have been two meetings of Diocesan Synod in 2019. At the May meeting topics included approving the Diocesan accounts, receiving an update from the team who support the Diocesan focus on poverty (in all its aspects). Bishop Sarah (newly arrived) was interviewed by members of the children's council. It was fascinating to hear of her faith journey from the Welsh mining valley to her calling to be a bishop. The Synod reflected on the clergy covenant – a framework to support clergy and their congregations work mutually to ensure the wellbeing of clergy. Synod was updated on the preparations for Waymark 2019: the Diocesan conference which was happening in early Autumn 2019. The November meeting started with a reflection on our responsibilities as stewards of God's creation, and how should congregations be responding to this. A main item was endorsing the Diocesan budget for 2020 which shows an operating deficit as expenditure outstrips income and reserves are diminishing. The Synod reflected on the recent Waymark 2019 conference where representatives of each parish had come together over a weekend to share what God has been doing and start to discern the Diocese's priorities for the next 3-5 years. The meeting also heard a report from Children's Society on the issues of child poverty in our land.

Administration

The decision to make two separate roles of Receptionist, and Administrator will I think work extremely well, and I am looking forward to the future of this relationship.

The Receptionist having responsibility for being the welcoming face of All Saints' to be available to pray and help and encourage both church members and visitors, amongst other things. I have already started to think of ways we can encourage more activities and use of our facilities during the week.

The Administrator will be able to concentrate more on the increasing amount of Administration that a busy growing church needs, without interruption. At the time of writing we have applications for the job being considered. We pray God will help the right person to be appointed.

Fabric Report and Maintenance

This was an exceptionally busy year for repair, refurbishment and replacement projects at All Saints with our maintenance budget being well and truly spent.

The lighting to the centre toilets was upgraded early in the spring and the whole of the church centre roof was checked and repaired as required. Following a successful application to the council we were able to carry out essential pruning of the trees on site including the removal of one that was leaning close to the building.

The summer months saw the decorating of the main hall and the installation of new more effective blinds to the windows. As the hall is used so much by both church groups and external bookings it is essential that we maintain a good standard of decoration. The purchase of a new floor cleaning machine will allow the floors to be cleaned more efficiently and to a higher standard.

This year has seen some more major work on the Church flats with double glazing and new electric heaters being installed to the downstairs flat. Our commercial tenant in the upstairs flat continues to be really happy with the space and its location close to the station; and during the summer carried out work at his expense to provide more office space within the property. Our thanks go once again to Matt Falcus for liaising with our tenants and managing the flats on a weekly basis.

2019 saw the next stage of our Reach Project with Phase 1a during the Spring with our new heating system being installed. Our heating is now not only more reliable but also more efficient and we have already seen a reduction in gas usage in the church by over a third. Thanks go to our Reach Committee for taking over the project and in particular to Richard Spratt for once again being our main contact with the contractor. A lot of time has also been spent by our Reach members preparing documents, specifications and meeting with our architect and suppliers for the successful faculty application for our next major phase of the work in the chancel area. After receiving tenders in September and the congregation being able to provide the finance during the autumn, the work is due to commence early in 2020.

Numerous other items of work have been carried out on our buildings throughout the year. It is great to have our caretaker Peter on site during the day to deal with the ongoing maintenance of the buildings and grounds. Thank you to our administrative and caretaking staff for liaising with contractors when essential maintenance is required.

We are grateful to Nina Rye for taking on the Food safety and kitchen team and ensuring we retained our 5 star food safety status; and also the teams from the various ministries who are deep cleaning the kitchen each term.

We continue to work with Jonathan Backhouse to ensure that our H&S policies and risk assessments meet current requirements and update them as required.

It is wonderful to see the church buildings so well used at all times of the day and bookings for use of the facilities continue to be in demand. We are extremely grateful to God for all the people he brings into our buildings and the continued growth of All Saints.

We would also like to thank our fantastic team of assistant wardens who look after our services each week.

I (Karen) am now in my ninth year as a warden (with a gap in the middle) and it has been a duty and absolute joy to serve as warden during that time. Time has flown but it is now time to stop and take up Nana duties for a couple of years.

Safeguarding

This year it has been a blessing to me to be able to talk to our ministry leaders about any of their concerns and help make All Saints a safe place for children and young people to be.

Midweek Worship

At All Saints' we worship together midweek with Morning Prayer (daily), informal Holy Communion and Play and Praise (weekly), Treasure Seekers and Lunch Club services (monthly). Our youth gather in midweek as well for worship and discipleship. Then there are groups meeting fortnightly in homes in their various forms. Finally, there are brief reflections at Seated Exercise and Youth Club. All of this is covered elsewhere in this annual report.

Morning Prayer (30 minutes) is drawing a few new people, up to about ten, from both the 9am and 10.30am congregations, to pray daily in the temporary chapel for the life of All Saints', our mission partners, local Christian outreach to the poor and needy, the persecuted church and the suffering world. This will move into the new chapel once it is completed in April.

The midweek Communion service (30 minutes in the Meeting Room) is less formal, with an open discussion on a Bible passage - last year we covered most of Luke's Gospel - a simple Eucharistic prayer and time for tea or coffee afterwards in the Youth Room for those who can stay. This service attracts 20-30 people and will also move into the new chapel shortly.

Prayer

Rob Govier and helpers continue to promote and encourage the work of prayer at All Saints, supplementing those who meet faithfully for morning prayer, a steadfast and continuing work which should not be overlooked! The "Ablaze" monthly meeting has seen a gradual growth in numbers, generally running with around 20-plus attendees. Increasingly, rather than have a tight structure, we have sought The Holy Spirit in the manner of Romans 8:26 regarding prayer topics. Far from becoming unfocussed and undisciplined, we find that He has his own structure and agenda which we can discover if we are sensitive to His leading, as well as bold, and obedient. The regular prayer breakfasts have been led in a similar manner, and though not as well supported, have been times of fervent praying and good fellowship.

The All Saints Facebook group is used for daily distribution of a thirty-day programme of focused prayer topics for the church, it's members, and wider area. A paper copy of these topics can be obtained from Sandra Griffiths. Unfortunately, it is not possible to put these in a neat, manageable, and compact paper document due to the range and scope of issues. Whether we feel comfortable with social media or not, the "prayer work" is getting done, which is our key priority! I would encourage those who do not participate to consider joining the Facebook group, as it is an outstanding means of rapid communication.

Half-nights of prayer have been held, attracting a small but faithful band of prayer warriors, although it would be great to see more saints participating even for half an hour or so. Increasing use has been made of the resources of the "Thy Kingdom Come" initiative, a week of focused national prayer. Overall, across the life of the church, we seem to see more things "coincidentally going better", as well as some specific direct answers to prayer. Prayer ministry after the 1030 service continues to attract those with needs. We continue to both facilitate and encourage effective prayer within All Saints, especially so as we continue to face the challenges of growth, reordering and "planting out" at St Paul's Newton in 2020.

Young Adults

Youth (Midweek) Outreach
