### Opening Prayers – John Littlehailes shared his thoughts

- a) We are here at a curious time of flux: in our parish we are in the midst of change, but more importantly, the world is still caught in the throes of the Covid crisis, with thousands dying daily, adding to the one and a half million deaths already acknowledged, and this is probably a significant underestimate of its true scale. But, we hope that we can already see the beginnings of the end ahead, with the vaccines appearing, and vaccinations starting here. At the same time we in this country are on another cusp, as it seems that we may well be leaving the EU with no trade agreement, after so many years within its systems. It is all very much as though we are going through a monster roller-coaster ride.
- b) There will be momentous change during the coming months it is predictable, even if we cannot, right now see more than a set of probabilities, and a series of scenarios about which there is no agreement. I think we need to hold tight. These are indeed momentous times.
- c) But in reality all of this is as nothing compared to the events of, in round numbers, two thousand years ago. Then, existed prophecies, dating back hundreds of years, of a coming Messiah, but only a hint (as seen in retrospect) that he would be God incarnate through a young girl in a remote village in Israel. We say easily God incarnate, God made flesh, but in fact, this ran counter to all that people then thought about God, the mighty creator, the Lord of all that exists, and still is, expressing himself through thunder and lightning, through convulsions of the earth, and going to send a militant Messiah to come to Israel's rescue at an indeterminate, but longed for time. He also spoke through whispers to a chosen few. He was far beyond human understanding: unapproachable even in his temple except by the priests.
  - d) And then in Bethlehem, the incredible happened. I'm a pedant, and well known for it, and I'm using that word deliberately. (Not in its corrupt form as it is now) It was amazing, wonderful and astonishing, so astonishing as to be incredible. The Wise Men are said to have understood that an earthly King had been born, with the unhappy result that Herod feared for his throne, and who, acting in character (a singularly unpleasant one, at that) flailed about, killing children, but probably only Mary fully understood that something even more truly astonishing had happened:



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	that the veil between the supernatural and the natural worlds had been torn, that God had entered his world as a human baby, the creator of universes, the architect of life itself helpless except for the loving care of his earthly mother and father.
	e) It is this crisis point, God's physical presence arriving in the physical world, this tipping of the world's spiritual axis that we'll be celebrating soon. Celebrating that birth, yes, with an outpouring of joy, but even more the prospect of another outpouring, the outpouring into the earth of forgiveness and of grace brought about by the cruel death of that child after a scant 30 years or so, a death undertaken in obedience so that those he loved might be saved. It is this death and the subsequent resurrection that makes the incredible credible, as St. Paul recognised. I like the Message Bible translation of 1 Corinthians 15 "if there's no resurrection for Christ, everything we've told you is smoke and mirrors. Not only that, but we would be guilty of telling a string of barefaced lies about God."
	f) Behind the rituals of trees and tinsel, of presents and feasting, there is this staggering, mind blowing, almost incomprehensible truth: God here, God incarnate for our salvation, God's love for us, God's forgiveness.
	g) So we celebrate Christmas as the birth of our Saviour, his manifestation here on earth, but also as the promise of hope and light for us, and for the whole world.
	h) John then closed with the Grace from 2 Corinthians 13:14.

He suggested that there might be somebody who has got a gift and that this could be the thing that that brings them in and flourishes them in the ministry in the church so I'd see it as an opportunity. i) This was challenged and discussed by Lucy, Diane, Pam and Jonathan - they felt this role should be undertaken by someone who is known well within church and trustworthy as they would have access to members personal/financial details. j) Martin said he will put something out in the weekly newsletter in the new year. ACTION Martin. k) Diane asked if they would need to be co-opted onto the PCC, it was confirmed that they would. l) Scott asked if it was known who John Lambert had in mind before offering the role to Kevin Storer. He added that the Policy needs updating.</li> <li>b) He and Anne had suggested to Jonathan that this fitted with his role as the PCC Secretary.</li> <li>c) Paul Arnold guessed that his understanding of the regulation, being European, was that as of the 1st of January we may not even need to think about GDPR on leaving the EU.</li> <li>d) Jonathan agreed that this may be the case as we will have left Europe, but there still will be a need for some type of Data Protection Policy and the need for a Data Protection Officer [under the Data Protection Act 2018].</li> <li>q) Jonathan added that he intends to take on the role once he has completed an online training</li> </ul>
