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Chair's Report

There is much to be grateful for this year and there have been many highlights.

23 people got baptised; many of whom made public professions of faith and shared their stories with us. What an encouragement!

This year we have done quite a lot of tweaking of what was good for people to explore faith more easily. This has often meant going smaller with numbers to ensure space to explore and go deep in relationships. This has been true across Friday night youth, across Messy Church, and Connect are looking this year at how to offer more opportunities to those wanting to find out more about Jesus.

We have seen new Life Groups begin as well as the 20+ group gaining momentum. In addition, this year we launched mentoring, and it has been a joy both to mentor some people myself, but also to see some of the change it is making in the faith and lives of others within the congregation. To me it feels as if we are gaining new confidence in the role God has called each of us to play, the gifts he has given us, and the story of our lives transformed by Jesus which is so good to share with others.

The Church Camp back in October was brilliant and gave opportunity for getting to know each other on a deeper level across all ages. It was also great to mix with folks across All Saints' and St Mary's as part of it and to forge some of those bonds. I look forward to our next camp in July (which should be warmer!) and avoiding getting pushed around in a Zorb this time!

We have continued to grow as a church both numerically and in seeing God move in our services. People have continually remarked what an easy church it is to join, and for it to become home. Looking back over the year it is significant how many people have not only started to attend on a Sunday but gone on to join life groups, to serve and become integrated into the life of the church.

Our services, both 9am, 10.30am and Encounter continue to develop with new people starting to preach, lead and lead worship, moving forwards as well as including discovering all our sound desk can do! We have pressed into celebrating risk and my thanks to those of you who are stepping out and seeing what God will do and being vulnerable enough to share those things with us.

Behind the scenes a lot has been going on to improve our systems, and my thanks to Diane in Safeguarding, and those who have worked to ensure our policies are fit for purpose. The Wardens have been amazing and have helped no end in providing wise counsel and keeping us moving forwards together.

As we continue through 2023, we look forward to seeing all God will do. It may at times be a bumpy ride with all that is going on nationally and internationally with the Anglican Church, but God is good, he will continue what he has started. God uses all things for good and perhaps the current storm will lead us deeper in prayer

and to further the excellent work that has gone on by many of you to help us hear God more clearly and share his love.

Locally, amongst us and in our communities, I could not be more grateful to God for all He is doing and to you all for how you are continuing to say to him 'Here I am send me'. Thanks for being part of the All Saints' family and for all you do to help it serve God in this place. With every blessing

Wardens' Report

It is our privilege to serve as wardens at All Saints' Church where all are warmly welcomed. As an inclusive church we believe that we are here to serve the local and wider community within the parish.

During this last year it has been possible for us to gradually return to normal worship and to take Communion without the necessary Covid safeguards and restrictions being in place.

It is difficult to estimate the level of disruption Covid caused to us at All Saints', but we now feel excited at all the different initiatives and opportunities that are taking place and we have been so blessed with many newcomers attending and contributing in different ways to our work at All Saints'.

The new Baptistry was installed prior to the Covid restrictions and was tested before it was used for the first time. This year several baptisms have taken place and having a permanent Baptism Pool available has certainly contributed positively to the experience of those being baptised and their families and our congregation.

There is a Church of England Directive that states our Church Building must be inspected every 5 years by a suitably experienced professional. This is known as a Quinquennial Inspection. This year our previous Architect, David Beaumont, retired which meant we had to appoint a new Inspector. We interviewed and took up references on three candidates from which we selected Jamie Holden of Studio Tamacoco Architects. Once we obtained approval from the Diocesan Advisory Committee, we were able to appoint Jamie Holden. His QI Inspection took place on 23rd June 2022 and the report followed promptly. A copy of which was sent to all PCC members. The purpose of the Quinquennial report is to ensure that All Saints' Church buildings are safe and in good repair and generally our report was positive. Following the recommended timeline within the report, the PCC Building Group is focusing on undertaking the remedial works required to be completed by June 2023.

Due to storm damage, repairs to the Church, Centre and 558b and 558a roofs have taken place and the problem of water leaking from the skylights in the Centre foyer and kitchen has been rectified.

Towards the end of the year, it was noted that squirrel damage had occurred to the fascia and soffit boards on the north side of the centre building. A pest control inspection was arranged, and a temporary repair completed. A full repair has been arranged for March 2023.

Various work has been carried out in Flat 558b, in the main to solve the ongoing issue of damp due to excessive condensation. In addition, some work has been carried out to the shower room although a complete refit will take place next year. Our thanks to both Matt Falcus and to our Caretaker, Peter Lankford, for their continued assistance in improving the conditions within the Flat and in managing repairs and remedial work.

Tees Valley Youth for Christ continue to rent the upper level of Flat 558a and this arrangement continues to work well.

The Diocesan Records Office visitation of our Parish Records took place at the end of December. The inspector was complimentary of the wardens for the way they had maintained the Church documents.

Our thanks go to: -

Nina Rye for continuing to manage the Food safety and kitchen teams and ensuring we retain our 5-star food safety status. Food Hygiene refresher courses are planned for next year.

The team of Assistant Wardens, namely: Karen Killick, Matt Falcus, Martin Howard, Stuart Johnson and Kevin Webster. Our thanks go to them for ensuring the smooth running of our Sunday services. 
Treasurer's Report

Review of 2022

2022 has yet again been an encouraging year financially. Having set a deficit budget for the year, we were blessed with one off donations at the start of the year which put us on track to be almost in line with our budgeted expenditure. During the year, we incurred significant expenditure on maintenance due to being back full time in the buildings. Despite this increased expenditure, we were still able to report a modest surplus of £296.47 for the year!


Income:

- Voluntary income for 2022 has once again increased, with notable increases in the amounts received through the Parish Giving Scheme. We received one-off donations again during the year which was a welcome boost to our regular giving. The number of people giving through the collection plate has reduced.
- Income from the hire of the Centre has increased during the year, notably due to Slimming World using the premises twice a week at levels similar to 2019.
- The Solar panels continued to contribute to unrestricted income.
- The overall unrestricted income for the year was £264,008.80.



Expenditure:

- We continued to give away 10% of our unrestricted voluntary income to local and overseas mission.
- The PCC paid its Parish Share pledge in full in the sum of £106,600.
- All Saints' PCC continued to ensure that all staff are paid at, or higher than, the Living Wage advised by the Living Wage Foundation.
- Overall expenditure on unrestricted funds totalled £263,712.33 for the year.



The budget for 2022 was approved with a deficit of £7,000. Despite having increased expenditure as a result of returning to normal ministry activity, we were blessed with increased giving and also some significant one-off donations at the start of the year. The current levels of reserves are approximately £50,000 which has meant that the PCC were able to approve a deficit budget of £10,000 for 2023. The PCC continue to balance the need for prudence and common sense with faith that God will provide for what we are called to do as a church.

I would like the thank, in particular, Margaret Vaughan for her support as Gift Aid Secretary and Gill Wake for her regular trips to the bank to deposit the weekly collection and other income throughout the year.

Most importantly, we are so grateful to each and every person who have contributed to God's work here at All Saints' Church through prayer and/or financial giving. Prayer underpins everything we do and our finances enable it to happen. Please continue to pray for God's provision and protection as we endeavour to realise the calling of His Church; to worship Him, proclaim the Gospel and reach out to those in need.

Finally, I would like to commend Guy Wingate to you, who has agreed to take over the role as Treasurer following the APCM. I have enjoyed serving All Saints' in this capacity once again but am excited for what Guy can bring to this role in the years ahead.

Safeguarding Report

Safeguarding is part of our core faith and an integral feature of Christian life.

In the Parish Safeguarding Handbook, Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury, says, "Safeguarding' means the action the Church takes to promote a safer culture in all our churches. In order to achieve this we need to do a lot of hard work. We will promote the welfare of children, young people and adults. We will work to prevent abuse from occurring. We will seek to protect those who are at risk of being abused and respond well to those who have been abused. We will take care to identify where a person may present a risk to others, and offer support to them whilst taking steps to mitigate such risks."

To accomplish this at All Saints' during 2022 we have:

- Continued to follow National and Durham Diocese Safeguarding policies and guidelines. At the beginning of the year the new Church of England 'Safer Recruitment and People Management Policy' was implemented. We have managed to embed this into our procedures and all ministries that involve children, young people and vulnerable adults safely recruit their volunteers in line with this policy.
- Continued to update DBS checks (now every 3 years) and safeguard training as needed. We are encouraging staff and volunteers to use the DBS update service.
- Have completed Level 1 of the new Parish Safeguard Dashboard implemented by the Church of England. Levels 2 and 3 are to be completed during 2023.
- Continued to have safeguarding as an item on the agenda at every PCC meeting for updates.
- 39 strategic members of All Saints' having completed additional training: 'Raising Awareness of Domestic Abuse'.

Throughout the year there have been several safeguard concerns raised. These have all been sensitively handled and supported, and advice from Diocesan Safeguard Adviser, Beth Miller, has been sought where needed.

Previously I have stated that it is everyone's responsibility to create a proactive culture of protection in developing a thriving, healthy and safe church. During 2022 I have seen much evidence of this working at All Saints' extremely well. I would, therefore, like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their commitment to help make All Saints' a safe place for all, and for the support and encouragement of individuals as I have continued in this role.

At the May 2022 meeting I informed the PCC that I was going to focus solely on the role of PCC Secretary and would, therefore, not take on the additional roles of Health and Safety Consultant, or the GDPR Officer. During 2022 there were two resignations from the PCC: John Belmont as Treasurer, and myself as PCC Secretary, both with effect from 31st December 2022. Guy Wingate took on the post of Treasurer. Diane Backhouse has taken on the role as Interim PCC Secretary, until the APCM in May 2023.

For 2022 we tweaked many of the PCC working parties, so we were slightly differently focussed to 2021. Each group has made significant progress with the **Buildings team** now working far more closely with the wardens and helping take some of the strain to keep us on track in that area. The **Environment team** has been working on engaging others in and outside the church in helping us be mindful of the environment and pursuing Eco church status. The **Discipleship team** has helped launch a calendar of courses such as the Shapes, Hearing God, and Sharing Faith course with more to follow on Parenting, Marriage, and other topics. The **Community Engagement team** continues to work with local partners and to show people we care and are interested in the benefit of those who do not come to this church. The **Social team** have done a wonderful job of organising opportunities for us to come together and get to know one another. The introduction of a calendar so we can plan what is coming has been particularly welcome. And finally, the **Policy team** has helped reduce and rewrite our policies, so they are easier for you to use. Matt expressed thanks to all for their work. He hopes it has been made clear that these groups are not exclusive so if you want to join one to pitch in just let Matt know.

As I close off my last official act as the [now Immediate Past] PCC Secretary I would like to thank those who have served All Saints' during my tenure for the last 2 ³/₄ years.

St Paul's – The Road Goes On

It is great to know that you are praying for us and supporting us as we continue in building church here at St Paul's. It is wonderful to know that we have Jesus, who binds us together as part of his body.

Serving God at St Paul's is awesome! We can really see God at work here. From the kids in our youth club beginning to make right choices in life, to our wonderful toddler group where community worship and mission seem to just work, or our regular coffee mornings or other community events that reach people and connect with them to help them to see more of God's love in this part of town.

God has grown the church family: we now have a community of nearly 60 people, and we have needed to start a new service to make room. The congregation is now much younger. About half are new Christians or returning to church. Our life group has experimented with planting a café and prayer space (called Oasis) in our local community centre, and this has proved a valuable place for people who need it as well as a great lesson in taking risks for Jesus.

It can be easy to let some of the challenges blind us, despite God's goodness here. We are growing fast and needing to keep pace with growth in our structures, relying on a small team of volunteers which can be exhausting. Whilst we have some great ministries happening, we know that our ability to afford them financially is still very dependent on money from the central church which has a time limit on it. But we put our trust in God and know that where he wants things to happen, he will motivate people to pray, to give, and to serve with his love.

Do keep praying for us that we may continue to see people coming to Jesus, and for his provision. I will leave you with some words from one of our older members: "I used to tell people I was thinking about them. Now, I tell them that I am praying for them."

Deanery Synod

2022 saw four meetings of Stockton Deanery Synod – the group that meets regularly to connect the Church of England churches in our area, share good practice and mutual support and encourage each other in mission and ministry.

February 2022, we met at Christchurch and heard from Jennie Sharp how the parish is addressing poverty through a new venture – Chad's Pantry which sells short dated or donated food and supports the local community.

May 2022 the meeting was held at St Michael's Norton. We heard from an American mission team, and Catherine Simpson spoke on growing in faith.

September 2022, we met at St Albans, Trimdon Grange where John Cottey, from Stockton Parish Church, challenged us about how we can disciple others, particularly through adult mentorship.

November 2022, we met at St Peter's Yarm Road. The theme of the evening was Diocesan Transformation – how the Church of England needs to develop and change in the next 10 years. Duncan Podbury spoke, and the meeting was open to anyone who wanted to attend.

Over 2023 the meetings will focus on some of the Diocesan priorities - Growth, Youth and Children's work, Caring for God's Creation and Tackling Poverty.

Diocesan Synod

There have been two meetings of Diocesan Synod in 2022 (both in person meetings).

May 2022 had significant items on:

- The progress on plans for the Diocesan Transformation programme.
- The 2021 Financial statements for the Diocese.
- Focus on how parishes could engage with supporting the Ukrainian refugee crisis and living out "caring for those in need" as part of the Diocesan priority on poverty.
- Input on the experiences of the Gypsy, Romany and Traveller communities and how churches can support them.
- Bit of legal stuff about how the Diocesan Board of Education (responsible for church schools) needed to be reshaped to meet changing ecclesiastical legal requirements.

November 2022 meeting had items on:

- Caring for God's creation with a focus on the environmental footprint of churches.
- A "financial technical" item on adopting a total return policy for the Diocese's capital investments (this will result in additional funds being released to support the Diocese's mission and ministry).
- Update on Diocesan Transformation plans and details on the streams of activities being developed for funding from central church.
- Adopting the 2023 budget.
- Focus on how churches can support their communities as the cost of living crisis /energy costs crisis starts to impact.

The Diocesan Synod operates on a three year cycle of membership - Karen Killick and Margaret Vaughan are both lay members and Matt Levinsohn is one of the clergy members, all till summer 2024. Please do ask any of these three if you want further details on any Diocesan Synod business.

Youth

We want to help young people become life-long followers of Jesus.

With this vision in mind, it has been such a joy to see our young people connecting with God this year.

There have been many ways for them to do this:

- Attending Youth Church where we connect as family, invite God to speak to us through talks, and worship and pray together.

It has been amazing to see Teesside young people come together for Refresh! Refresh is about 'Bringing Teesside young people together to encounter God, be transformed and change their world'. We welcomed amazing speakers like Tim Alford (Limitless Youth) and Esther Swaffield of International Justice Mission who spoke at our first ever day festival!

We were excited to return to summer camps in 2022, and our youth group attended 'Satellites'. It was an incredible time of meeting with God, and we saw a few young people make commitments to Jesus as well as others who had a profound experience of God.

We returned to Mexico where, thanks to the sacrificial support of our church family, we were able to bless a family with a new home, which will provide them with security and enable their family to remain together. As a team we connected as family in a beautiful way and most importantly connected with God in a powerful way too.

Throughout the year we have also been connecting with young people from our local community. Our detached youth team visited the skate park regularly, showing local young people that God loves them and so do we! We have welcomed many local young people to our Youth Club and tell them about Jesus every week. Kathryn had the opportunity to return to Egglescliffe School to deliver Christmas assemblies. Our quarterly Café Church is also a great, relaxed place for young people to invite their friends to discover Jesus!

Children

This past year has been exciting because most areas of ministry were able to start back up with a few tweaks, and we were able to move forward with new ministry too. Here are some of the highlights:

God's Giants Group – I started this after school group for our church children in years 5 and 6 in March and we have been meeting fortnightly ever since. It has certainly been a highlight for the leaders and children who say they love coming to it. We play football, games/activities, have a Bible time and discussion based around that, and eat treats. It has been such a great way to help the children build good friendships together and with us as leaders, and to feel they have their own more grown-up space to play and grow spiritually. A boy from the community, who we link with through Preston school, comes along too and he is coming some Sunday mornings to church. Another highlight is the trips out with this group - things like Clip and Climb, Burger King, and bowling - opportunities for fun and friendship building.

Schools Ministry – after losing connection with some local schools during covid times, 2022 provided several key opportunities to re-connect and build on those links.

The Life Exhibition – (a multimedia presentation) which we hosted for a week in March and provided a fantastic opportunity to invite more than 300 primary aged children with their teachers from 7 local schools to discover all about Jesus' life and ministry in a fun and relevant way. It was also a great time to talk with teachers and arrange to support their schools in other ways.

Puppet Based Bible Themed Event – we invited 120 younger children from Junction Farm and Preston schools to our All Saints' in June for activities, songs, instruments, puppets, etc. all based around a Bible theme. They were so excited and responsive, as were the teachers.

Christmas Schools Event in Church – was attended by approximately 320 children from 3 local schools. As well as the puppet songs the children loved the interactive activities we did as we shared the message of Christmas. School church tours, leading assemblies and lessons on baptism have also been highlights, along with the time spent with Preston Primary in church as they rehearsed, then presented their nativity and Christingle for their families.

Messy Church – it has been a joy to welcome back families who used to come prior to covid but also getting to know new families who have been joining and particularly encouraging that a few families from Preston school and our local community have come along. It has also been a really good time of developing the format from our normal way of running Messy to more of the Discovery/Café style church which we had only just started when covid hit. This has been allowing us to help families go a bit deeper spiritually and we will be moving fully from doing 'Messy church' to 'Discovery church' from May 2023.

Sunday Morning Ministry – Gems, Trailblazers, Trailblazers club

This past year has been a joy running our Sunday morning children's groups live again, and we have a few new families who have joined the church which is encouraging.

Trailblazer club – on a 3rd Sunday is popular with the children and a good way to help them bond. It is also a good intro for children from the community who have joined us and enjoy the club format.

Toddler Group and Play and Praise – it has been a positive year for both Toddler group and Play and Praise with new parents/carers joining us and opportunities to get alongside people to provide a listening ear, offer prayer and support.

Puppet Ministry – our Puppet team have worked hard recording videos of God songs and stories that are used in Gems and Play and Praise. Also, families love them at Messy church and they have been heavily involved in school events.

Family Social Events – other highlights include our family fun event in September and the Glow party in October which were well attended and enjoyed by families from our community and church.

A big Thank you to all my teams and we are excited to see what God has for 2023.

Ukrainian Family Support Café

The alternate weekly meetings of the Ukrainian Family Support Café have been invaluable for hosts and guests as they arrived and chatted and picked up advice on various aspects of settling in.
